Bramaderos Project, Ecuador

Espiritu drilling returns bonanza silver grades

Results include 1.1m at 1069g/t silver, 0.2g/t gold, 5.5% zinc and 1.3% lead in one of multiple lodes

Key Points

- Drilling at the Espiritu gold-silver target at Bramaderos has intersected high grade silver with gold, zinc and lead within a polymetallic epithermal system
- Drill hole ESDD005 has intersected three significant lodes of silver-gold-zinc-lead mineralisation including:
 - 145.8m to 148.2m; 2.4m at 104g/t silver, 0.7g/t gold, 3.4% zinc, 1.6% lead
 - o 225.5m to 226.6m; 1.1m at 1069g/t silver, 0.2g/t gold, 5.5% zinc, 1.3% lead
 - 259.1m to 270.7m; 11.6m at 167g/t silver, 0.2g/t gold, 2.1% zinc, 0.8% lead,
- The results so far suggest the grade of the mineralisation is increasing as drilling proceeds to the south; ESDD005 is the southern-most hole drilled to date
- This early success supports Sunstone's view of the strong prospectivity of several other targets which have many geological similarities to Espiritu
- Drilling at Espiritu is ongoing with further results expected during December

Sunstone Metals Ltd (ASX: STM) is pleased to advise that it has discovered a significant polymetallic silvergold-zinc-lead 'intermediate sulphidation' epithermal system at the Espiritu target within its Bramaderos project in southern Ecuador.

Assay results from the first five diamond drill holes at Espiritu contain bonanza silver grades within multiple silver-gold-zinc-lead vein and breccia intervals (Tables 1-2, Figures 3-5).

The drill holes have tested the area below high-grade silver-gold-lead-zinc results recorded in trench and rock chip samples (see ASX announcements 13 July 202 and 10 September 2020).

Drilling to date has only tested to a depth of 145m below surface and across a strike length of 180m, suggesting that there is significant scope for a larger system based on surface anomalies defined to date. The early drilling results suggest the main mineralised systems may plunge. The structural geology is not well understood and will evolve with further drilling. Additional geophysics will be undertaken over the target area to help guide future drilling.



Sunstone Managing Director Malcolm Norris said: "These assay results are extremely encouraging. They demonstrate that potentially economic precious metal and base metal grades, including some bonanza silver grades occur within the Espiritu system across multiple lodes.

"There is clearly immense potential at Espiritu, which has not seen any historical exploration, and in light of these results, we will accelerate our exploration program. This is the first discovery of a silver-gold-zinc-lead system in the Bramaderos district and as such justifies some optimism that this may develop into a large system with further exploration.

"Globally, silver-polymetallic systems similar to Espiritu can be very significant development opportunities. Many examples occur in Central and South America where mines typically produce concentrates of lead-zinc-silver and gold.

"Other priority targets have been identified within the Bramaderos concession and these are being advanced during the current program. New areas of outcropping carbonate and barite alteration, typical of epithermal systems, with evidence of copper-lead-zinc mineralisation have been identified and will be scheduled for further exploration and drilling."

Drilling of the Brama porphyry gold-copper system is scheduled to commence prior to the end of 2020, and an update on activities at the El Palmar porphyry copper-gold project will also be provided prior to the end of 2020.




Figure 1: Close-up photo of drill core from the highest grade interval in ESDD005, 226m to 226.6m; 0.6m at 1,114g/t silver, 0.19g/t gold, 9.43% zinc, and 1.2% lead.




Figure 3: Espiritu target area showing current and planned drill hole locations, silver in rock chip samples and silver-in-soil as the backdrop image.







Figure 4: Cross section showing drill holes ESDD005 and 006




Figure 6: Location and status of other Espiritu style targets in the vicinity of the Espiritu drilling program. Target areas are outlined in white and are the subject of infill soil sampling and detailed geological mapping.

About Sunstone Metals

Sunstone has an advanced portfolio of exploration and development projects in Ecuador and Scandinavia. The portfolio comprises:

- 1. The Bramaderos Gold-Copper Project where Sunstone owns an 87.5% interest with TSXV listed Cornerstone Capital Resources holding 12.5% (see ASX announcement dated 10th April 2017, 28th August 2019, and 7 January 2020). The Bramaderos gold-copper project is located in Loja province, southern Ecuador, and is highly prospective for the discovery of large porphyry gold-copper systems, and high-grade epithermal gold systems. Historical exploration results from drilling at Bramaderos together with recent exploration by Sunstone and joint venture partner Cornerstone Capital Resources (TSXV:CGP) indicate multiple fertile mineralised systems with significant discovery potential.
- 2. **The El Palmar Copper-Gold Project** where the highly prospective 800ha El Palmar copper-gold porphyry project in Ecuador will be acquired through a Staged Acquisition Agreement, which will ultimately deliver 100 per cent ownership to Sunstone.
- 3. **Sunstone has a significant equity interest** of ~24% in Stockholm listed Copperstone Resources (COPP-B.ST) following the sale of the Viscaria Copper project to Copperstone in 2019.
- 4. The Southern Finland Gold Project includes the Satulinmäki gold prospect. Shallow diamond drilling was completed by the Geological Survey of Finland (GTK) during the period 2000-2005 and this was followed by a 7-hole diamond drilling program by Sunstone Metals in 2016. Intersections from GTK include 18m @ 4.1g/t Au from 50m downhole, including 3m @ 9.3g/t Au, and 4m @ 10.3g/t Au in drill hole R391. Intersections by Sunstone include 23.5m at 3.3g/t in SMDD007 and 2m at 10.5g/t in SMDD005. The Satulinmäki gold prospect is part of an earn-in JV with Canadian company Nortec Minerals, where Sunstone holds an ~83% interest.
- 5. **The Scandinavian Lithium Project** includes the Kietyönmäki lithium prospect. Drilling by Sunstone has delivered 24.2m at 1.4% Li2O in a spodumene-bearing pegmatite. Kietyönmäki is also part of the JV with Nortec Minerals.
